From the Files of the Detective Curator: Chana Orloff and The Case of the Mysterious Photo

A Community Scholar Program Presentation



During research on Chana Orloff's sculpture from 1919, a photograph was discovered in which she is recorded together with another woman and a young man (and probably another person who took the picture) in the living room of her home. They look smiling, relaxed and smartly dressed for going out together. The photo ignited Sophia Berry's curiosity, which led her on a detective journey and research for its traces. Many questions arose: Who are the other people in the picture? Where and when was it filmed? Under what

circumstances? What are the works hanging on the walls? And who is the photographer whose figure is absent from the picture but nevertheless present in the photograph? Join us to get some answers to "Chana Orloff and the Case of the Mysterious Photo".

Since 2016, Sophia Berry has been working as an Assistant Curator of Modern Art at the Tel Aviv Museum of Art (TAMA). Currently, she is on a two-year sabbatical in Denver, CO. Her position at TAMA includes responsibilities of managing exhibitions from our collections and external loans, researching the Museum's collections, overseeing outgoing loans, writing catalogue texts, and leading restoration projects. Sophia's latest project was a special exhibition of works by Amedeo Modigliani in honor of the centenary of his death. Sophia has also curated a special display dedicated to Joseph Israel's *From Darkness and Light* (1871), which was recently discovered to have been Jewish property before the War.

British Museum Tour

A Virtual Walk Inside a London Institution

Our walk begins with an introduction to the museum and the wonderful Great Court designed by Norman Foster before heading to the South Asia Gallery to see the Statue of Tara. Next, we head to the Gallery of Living and Dying where the main attraction is the Hoa Hakananai'a statue, one of the most controversial objects in the museum.



We then head to the African Galleries where we will see the highlight here, the magnificent Bronze Head from Ife before heading into the Medieval Europe Gallery to see the Lewis Chessmen (of Harry Potter fame) and the items from the Sutton Hoo burial sites.

Then it is on to the Egypt Gallery, where we will see both human and cat mummies before ending the tour at arguably the most important piece in the museum, the Rosetta Stone. (1 hour)

Radiance: Living a Life of Meaning

Danny Siegel's teachings have shaped modern Jewish education with his urgency about how to do acts of Tzedakah, Tikkun Olam, and deeds of compassion and generosity. His poems (many of which have been incorporated into Jewish liturgies over the years) are saturated with Jewish spirituality—its history, pain, exhilaration, and hope, and his prose essays are filled with



ideas for personal mitzvah projects that inspire readers to think creatively about how each of us is poised to make a difference in our communities, neighborhoods, and the world. Join us as Danny discusses his writing, his life work and his most recent book *Radiance: Creative Mitzvah Living*, an anthology of his most important writings, spanning and renewing fifty years of his insights.

Danny Siegel is best known for bringing the discussion of Tzedakah and doing Tikkun Olam back into Jewish communities. A well-known author, lecturer, and poet, Danny has spoken in more than 500 North American Jewish communities on personalized Tzedakah, Mitzvah heroes, and Jewish values. He is the author of numerous books, served as the Tzedakah Resource Person on the United Synagogue Youth Israel Pilgrimage for 37 years, and is a recipient of the prestigious Covenant Award for Exceptional Jewish Educators.
