Jews on the Silver Screen with Professor Howard Lupovitch

A Community Scholar Program Presentation (Recorded 1/15/24)



From the pioneering Jewish visionaries who shaped global cinema to the enduring fascination with biblical narratives and the layers they hold, we uncover the intersections of culture and storytelling. We examine three pivotal themes: the representation of the Holocaust in American culture and its lasting societal impacts; the depiction of antisemitism as a form of social discrimination, uncovering its various manifestations and consequences; and the concept of "soft" racism, highlighting the subtle yet pervasive forms of antisemitism in media and daily life.

Professor **Howard Lupovitch** is Professor of History and Director of the Cohn-Haddow Center for Judaic Studies at Wayne State University. He was educated at the University of Michigan, and Columbia University (earning a Ph.D. in History from the latter). Over his career, Prof. Lupovitch has taught at Cornell University, Colby College, the University of Western Ontario, and the University of Michigan, where he was also a fellow at the Frankel Institute for Advanced Judaic Studies. Prof. Lupovitch is the author, most recently, of *Transleithanian Paradise: A History of the Jewish Community of Budapest, 1738-1938*, and is presently completing a history of the Neolog Movement and researching a new history of the Jews of Detroit.

Brass music that will blow your mind: The Venezuelan Brass Ensemble under the baton of Thomas Clamor performed a rousing concert at the Konzerthaus Berlin. The program included brass arrangements of popular classical pieces such as Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition or Gershwin's I Got Rhythm, and also classics of South American dance music.

The Venezuelan Brass Ensemble was established in 2004, as an offshoot of the Simon Bolivar Youth Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela (known today as the Orquesta Sinfónica Simón Bolívar de Venezuela). The group brings together some of the most talented young brass and percussion players in the country to perform an extraordinary repertoire of pieces for massed brass bands.
